Phase I Construction Begins

Jesus said, "I came not to be served but to serve." Those of us who follow His example will have a new opportunity to be like Christ and serve others. As you know, on April 23 we broke ground on Phase One of our Facilities Expansion. Now we will see equipment being staged on the west side of our campus as construction begins on our Christian Life Center. That staging area will mean that we lose about 50 parking spaces so I hope you will join me in helping to make room for others by creating more free parking places so that our guests will feel welcomed on our campus.

Some church experts like Lyle Schaller contend that the one thing that has affected the church the most in the last 50 years is the automobile. If you are a little skeptical about that, consider this. If you were building a church in 1950, the congregation was advised that they would need just enough land for the building itself to accommodate their needs. In 1960 we were told to purchase about 1 acre. In 1970 we were told to purchase five acres. In 1980 we were advised to buy no less than ten acres of

land to start a new church. Now we are advised to not start a church without 30 acres of land at the minimum and preferably we should have 50-100 acres. Why? The automobile has changed our driving patterns and most everything else about society from shopping malls to churches. The standard rule of thumb is that a church needs one parking space for every two people it has on site. After construction starts, we will have about 350 spots so you can do the math. Our best answer over the foreseeable future is shuttling.

We want to improve the experience of shuttling for all our people and so your Trustees under the leadership of Barbie Dickens are in the process of purchasing two shuttle buses like you would use at the airport. One will carry 29 passengers and cost 56,000 and the other will be handicapped accessible, carry 15 passengers, and cost \$40,000. The arrival of these buses is still about three months away. Our intention is to make these shuttles as user friendly as we can so you will discover that there is no better way to get to and from the church than to ride with your friends in

air-conditioned comfort and safety. The pick-up and drop-off point remains the Brownsboro Shopping Center in front of the Party Mart. We are also exploring whether another location might help us avoid the delays that occur at US 42 and I-264.

Everyone can help in this endeavor. Some of us may want to serve by being trained as drivers. This can become your ministry to others. If you have some interest in that direction, call Barbie Dickens or the church office, and we will arrange for that to happen. Some of us can help financially by helping to pay for the additional \$96,000 involved in the purchase of these buses. If you can make a gift, please contact Jim Crain or Ted Champion who are the point people on the funding side of this project. All of us could give up an extra five minutes in our travel time so that we continue to make Christ Church a place of hospitality and welcome to all who come searching for a message of hope and love on their journey. I ask you to consider doing one of these things to make that a reality.

Looking Inward

“When Low on Spiritual Oil”

“I just don’t care anymore!” Any of us can arrive at a point in our lives when this quote rolls out of our own mouths. This low point usually happens because of something that has been taken from us. The loss of a job, a divorce, a rejection, or abandonment can hurl us upon the doorstep of despair and “what’s the use” clouds our mind. It’s at such “hot” points that we become aware of how much or how little spiritual oil is in our engine.

By “spiritual oil” I mean the additive of a Presence within our lives that instills a peace beyond our understanding. Without this Presence, we become absorbed within ourselves, literally trapped, spinning our wheels as if in a mud puddle. As we misplace objects and people into the center of our lives, heat and stress begin to mount, signaling red lights to appear upon our dashboard. This oil, this soul oil, is the life blood of the human spirit. The warning signals appear in every aspect of our life: mentally, emotionally, physically, relationally, etc. They appear not to punish us but to alert us.

I connect the Presence with an inward peace because I believe as humans we are our most hopeful, productive, loving, and together when in a state of peace. Take away this peace and we slide back into “chaos.” This chaos breaks down all components of our lives. After too long, low oil

produces a detachment from the living in life. Smoke begins to appear. We do one of two things to deal with the lack of centeredness in our lives: *pull away or lung forward.*

Pulling away generates an anger and depression about life in general. Purpose and meaning dissolve into a deep sense of “what’s the use.” Others experience us more withdrawn than usual. We make excuses for “not connecting” to life. Our pulling away is a type of “passive confrontation” of life. We aren’t going to waste anymore energy being angry-indifference will do better. Our un-centeredness becomes a protest of the unfairness and disappointment that comes with living. We stuff the center of our lives with nothingness, with a vacuum, with despair, with a bent back, slumped shoulders, and a curled lip. The Presence hasn’t showed up the way we thought it was supposed to. We pull off the main highway onto a one lane dirt road and just sit. “What’s the use in driving down the highway anymore?” we ask as we stew.

Lunging ahead is another signal of “low spiritual oil.” *We lung to replace the Presence with a part of creation.* We seek peace and security in another person, in prosperity, in social status, in our own gifts, in our children, in a substitute for real oil. We lung with angry determination for something that

is real, tangible, and capable of immediate results. *These substitutes for God’s presence can’t stand the heat of life.* You know what I mean. Have you ever felt that another person looked to you to heal their scars, to make up for what they didn’t receive in their childhood, to pay for the sins of others, or to take responsibility for convincing them they are worth loving. If you were nodding your head to the above, then you know how it feels to be stuffed in the middle of this other’s life to be God to them. It melts you down. Low spiritual oil makes us all desperate in one way or another.

“I don’t care anymore” may be our way of saying “I don’t feel cared for by anyone, even God.” Open and honest confession of the dirt that has clogged our lives is a beginning step in taking care of our spiritual oil problems.

Expression of anger and disappointment was the Psalmist’s way of reconnecting with the Center of life. The writer often began with a simple “God, where are you in the middle of my mess?” Let’s journey together in keeping an eye on our spiritual oil. The oil of care we express to one another can be a timely reminder that the Center still holds on to us even when our engine is smoking.
